The World's Fair For Nothing.

"THE NEW YORK PRESS" WILL PAY THE EXPENSES OF FIFTY TEACHERS TO THE CHICAGO EXPOSITION.

THE PRESS (New York) is making one of the most liberal offers ever made by any newspaper. It proposes to pay all the expenses of the fifty most popular school teachers—thirty from New York and Brooklyn and twenty from other places than New York and Brooklyn—to the world's fair at Chicago.


