## Gov. Broke Promise in DuPre Case Says Ridley

From The Atlanta Constitution  
Rev. Caleb A. Ridley, pastor of the Central Baptist church, and imperial chaplain of the Ku Klux Klan, in his sermon Sunday night, charged that Governor Hardwick allowed Frank DuPre to hang after promising Dr. Ridley personally that the sentence would be commuted to life imprisonment, that his action in allowing DuPre to be hanged was a "political play," and that his defeat was caused largely from such play.

Dr. Ridley was speaking on "How it all Happened," as a prelude to evening sermon when he made the charge against Governor Hardwick.

He said further that his broken promise in regard to DuPre was just one of many promises made to the voters of Georgia who elected him. Dr. Ridley traced the Governor's actions back to to his relations with the Law Enforcement league in these words:

"Governor Hardwick courted the favor of the inter-racial bunch in Georgia, with Jesse Mercer added in for good measure, by hitting the Ku Klux Klan below the belt. He got so mixed up with the inter-racial gang now operating as a law enforcement league that he was compelled to let DuPre hang after assuring me personally that a life sentence was what he would have. DuPre's execution was a political play which was resented by thousands of the voters of Georgia."

Dr. Ridley's talk was designed to his opinion of how Governor Thomas W. Hardwick came to be defeated in the governor's race

**WHY?**  
DO WE WAKE UP IN  
THE MORNING

THE human body "goes to sleep" in order that the heart and the brain have time to build up the portions of the body which have been used up during the day, by exertion of one kind or another.

Generally speaking, the brain acts as sort of an alarm clock which wakens us when the process of rebuilding has been completed and it is for this reason that persons who have been unduly fatigued sleep longer than those who have taken but little exercise. The process of awakening is principally due to two factors—the

former being the stronger of the two, persons who are quite tired when they retire find it difficult to wake up at their accustomed time, though an equal amount of fatigue upon going to bed each night will soon enable one to acquire the habit of arising at the same hour, no matter how early or late this may be. The process of natural awakening, therefore, is merely the result of being completely rested in all parts of the body—even though certain muscles may appear fatigued through unusual exertion on the preceding day.
